Dear Friends in Christ,

The appointed text for Thanksgiving is that old familiar Bible story about the ten lepers who, keeping their distance, cry out for Jesus to have mercy on them. Jesus does, indeed, heal all ten of them, and as they make their way to the priests so they can sign off on the miracle, one of them, a Samaritan, turns back to Jesus to give him thanks.

This is a lovely story with a lovely message, But what exactly, is that message? I suppose the simple lesson to be learned from the text is that we, like the Samaritan leper, should show our thanks for the way God has shown mercy to us; for the way God, in Christ, has healed us of the disease called sin. That's too easy, too simplistic, however. It doesn't probe the depths of why Jesus healed the Samaritan leper, and, conversely, it doesn't offer some good reasons why Jesus did not have to show any mercy to the leper at all.

Jesus didn't have to heal the leper. The Levitical law codes required lepers to keep their distance and to cry out "unclean" when around healthy folks. Jesus had the law on his side. Jesus didn't have to get involved. Jesus could have used the law to cover up his "leper phobia," if he had such a fear, but he didn't. No fear, no discomfort, no resentment towards the leper, just love and mercy. Who are the ones we resent today? Who are the ones who cause us to be afraid? We have a choice. We can be governed by our sin and deem them as "unclean," and not get involved, or we can follow the law of love as exemplified by Jesus, and embrace them as our brothers and sisters.

Let me pose another idea. Jesus was a Jew. The leper was a Samaritan. Jews and Samaritans had a history of hating each other. Jesus did not let that history stand in his way of caring for the leper. Jesus did not conform to the prejudicial way people of that day looked down upon people who were different. Throughout his ministry Jesus reached out to Jew and Gentile alike. He embraced the poor, the marginalized, and the outcast. He never demonized a person because of the color of his skin or his position in life. I'm not sure that people of the 21st century have changed all that much from those folks of 1st century Palestine. We hear a lot of nasty talk today. There is vicious name calling and a demonizing of others because they happen to be black or Muslim or old or whatever. Talk like this can lead to violence. This needs to stop. But before it does we have to stop labeling "them" as the culprits, as the sinners, and look to the prejudice that fills our own hearts.

So as brothers and sisters, as all who have fallen short of the glory of God, we cry out like the Samaritan leper, "Jesus, Master, have mercy on us!" In faith, we know that we have a Savior who will heal us of the sin that besets us so. And just like the Samaritan leper we will return to Christ and offer our gratitude and our pledge that we will live our lives in peace and harmony with those around us.

Feed My Sheep

It is hard to imagine a more fitting metaphor for Christian life than eating and sharing the bounty God provides for us. We all hunger, both for something hearty to eat and also for the fullness of Christ in our hearts each and every day.

It is when we come together to receive this gift of the body and blood of our Lord that we are united by our shared hunger as we are welcomed to God's table. So also we are united by the blessings of food and shelter which are meant to be shared among God's people.

However, we all are aware of the many in our community who do not share in these physical blessings and God is calling us to feed each other as we have been fed. Indeed, scripture is rich with images of Jesus urging us to reach out in compassion to feed those around us.

When the disciples wanted to send away the crowds, Christ replies *they need not go away – you give them something to eat*. Despite their doubts about being able to feed so many, God works through them to provide a meal for all. When asked how to show love for Him, Jesus replies simply and repeatedly to *feed my sheep*.

As a congregation, St. Paul's is exploring how we can answer this call to feed God's people in north-west D.C. We are expanding our food pantry to hold open distribution hours two Saturdays per

month. In order to obtain enough food for this effort, we are beginning a relationship with the Capital Area Food Bank to serve as a partner agency in our area.

We are excited at this opportunity to make use of the refurbished cabinets and kitchen area to store the food and to use the dining room for distribution. This also will be an excellent opportunity for families to get involved in the mission of our church by signing up to work a Saturday distribution. We will be working with many of our community partners (such as Community Council for the Homeless at Friendship Place) to spread the word about this new ministry as well.

All of us reading the headlines these days know that difficult times are approaching for many working families across the nation, especially in Washington, D. C. As hunger and access to nutritious food become real issues not only for the homeless but for working families with children, there is no better time for St. Paul's to reach out to our neighbors.

Volunteers are needed to work distribution and help "shop" for food. Also on October 25, we will be taking a group of volunteers to the Capital Area Food Bank to help sort food and learn more about their operations as our project for the national **Make a Difference Day**.
