Dear Friends in Christ,

As I write this for the April issue of *St. Paul's Trumpet*, I am also keeping a close eye on the Maryland - Memphis basketball game. It is March Madness, after all. It is halftime and Maryland is losing by twenty points. One can only hope for a huge comeback in the second half if Maryland hopes to continue in the tournament. Even though I always try to be the optimist, I must confess that it doesn't look good for the Terps. It all seems rather bleak.

From March Madness I turn to the economic madness that besets us so. Some of you have lost your jobs. Many of us have lost our savings and the necessary funds to live comfortably in retirement. Retirement, which for some was within close reach, now seems so very far away. It all seems rather bleak. We hope for a comeback.

I suppose nothing can be more maddening than watching a loved one lose his or her battle with a disease. It may be cancer, alcoholism or Alzheimer's disease. We hope that our prayers will be answered, that medical science will come up with a cure, that our loved one will make a comeback, but realistically we're not that sure.

Easter is not about basketball or the economic crisis, or even about some medical crisis, per se, but it is about one of the greatest comebacks ever. As such it gives us hope even when things look very bleak, indeed. You see on Good Friday, Jesus was crucified and he died. On Easter he came back, He came back from the dead to live eternally with his Father and with all of us. He came back from the terrible scourging and torture to show how important these horrible things can be against a faithful spirit. He came back from that gruesome death on a cross to show that hatred and misunderstanding can never win the day against love. He came back from that dark respite in the tomb to show that he lives and that he is loose upon the world and loose in our hearts and lives.

The Resurrection of Our Lord is about Jesus rising from the grave to live again. It also gives us the hope, as well as the courage, to rise above the madness of this world and all the ills that beset us so. It offers us all that gracious reminder that *I am the resurrection and the life. Those who believe in me, even though they die, will live, and everyone who lives and believes in me will never die.*

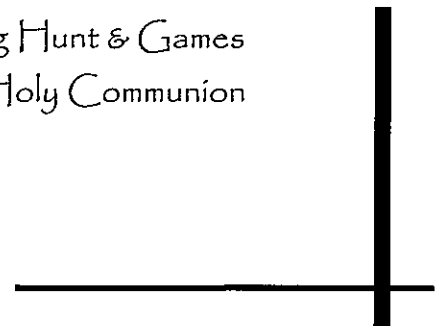

Easter Shout!

***He is risen! He is risen...
indeed! Alleluia!***

Yes, by the time you read this meditation we will have traveled through those long forty days of Lent. We began our journey on Ash Wednesday, walked with Jesus as he made his way to Jerusalem on Palm Sunday, and reflected on the powerful meanings of Passion Week that culminated at Calvary on Good Friday.

Yet, Christ's suffering and death on the Cross are not the end of our Lenten journey. Jesus continues to lead us from that Cross on Calvary to the tomb and onto the resurrection joy of Easter morning. Such a time of transformation for the church as it moves from sadness to such joy!

He is risen! Alleluia! These are the familiar Easter words, but how about a shout of "Hooray!" Think about it – "Christ the Lord is Risen Today; Hooray!" Wow! What a new version for an old familiar Easter hymn! Sounds like it could be some fun doesn't it? Yet, the word "hooray" has a very appropriate meaning for our Easter celebrations. In looking for the definition I almost overlooked it as it was short and sweet:

"hooray – to exclaim"

How perfect as the church is exclaiming the resurrection of our Lord! Hooray! Is it worth a try?

Probably not, as it would sound mighty strange to those sitting around you as loud "hoorays" replaced the alleluias in the hymns. Yet, Christ calls us to lead "alleluia" or "hooray" lives. That's pretty easy on Easter at St. Paul's as we rejoice with one another, singing songs filled with alleluias (and maybe, just maybe a few voices of hooray).

The bigger question for us is how do we shout Easter alleluias and hoorays in our daily lives — enabling us to share the Good News of the risen Savior?

It may seem a little difficult to discover ways to express an "alleluia" life, but in our modern society perhaps we can more easily connect to living Easter "hooray" lives — a hooray life lived in the full joy and celebration of exclaiming the Good News of Jesus' death and resurrection to save all of mankind! That's what Easter is all about isn't it? Rejoicing! Celebrating! Exclaiming!

So as we gather on Easter morning to rejoice in our risen Lord, remember that you're not going to worship to quietly say words that whisper *I Hope That My Redeemer Lives*, but to sing with voices that exclaim *I Know That My Redeemer Lives*.

So, sing forth with your joyous "alleluias" but let your hearts shout a loud "hooray!" I'll bet that you'll be blessed with an Easter smile!

Holy Land Update

April 26, 2009 -- 12:15 pm
Coffee Hour Discussion
Peace and Justice
in the Holy Land

The March 29, 2009 Metropolitan D.C. Synod Symposium at Church of the Redeemer focused attention on the enormity of the issues in the Israeli – Palestinian conflict.

For over half a century many groups have described events, advocated, and called for prayer. The five-point outline of the symposium includes these and adds a specific call —
“To encourage responsible action in support of peace and justice on the part of individuals and congregations .”

Advocacy and prayers are acts — of faith; the synod add the responsibility that individuals and congregations become the agents chosen in implementing the goals of peace and justice. The above call from the synod, a division of the greater ELCA, is joyously welcomed by smaller groups within churches (as is St. Paul’s Holy Land Program) as recognition or affirmation of the ethical authenticity of such endeavors as works of the church.

St. Paul’s is neither unique nor the “most” active Lutheran congregation to be involved in

this work, but we are well ahead of the curve. We are aware and we have acted. Beginning in the spring of 2005, and with official pastoral and Church Council support, our Holy Land Program has been sending assistance to the Lutheran schools in Bethlehem and Ramallah.

These schools perform a vital function in the lives of the children attending, as well as their families and neighbors in an area formed by decades of uncertainty. They have experienced cycles of hope, promise, upheaval, and tightened control as conditions have deteriorated.

Immediate problems relate to water shortages, pollution, settlement building, checkpoints, home demolition, sanctions on materials for maintenance, food, medicine, walls, separate roads....

In this sea of despair the schools present an image of hope and a model for the future. Their success is a major concern of Lutheran Bishop Munib Younan, ELCJHL (Evangelical Lutheran Church - Jordan and Holy Land).

Their goals and practices reflect those of a free and equitable society. Learning is based in searching and understanding, not recital of bias and rote.

The decency, dignity and respect which is fostered are part of the shared ethic of the majority of the Jews, Christians and Muslims

who want Peace and Justice in their land.

Your input, ideas and questions are needed to further define St. Paul’s role in Middle East Peace and Justice Initiatives.

The alternative is not pleasant to contemplate, should sparks ignite and spread the turmoil.

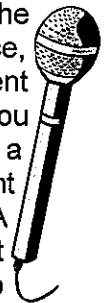


Rummage Sale on Saturday, April 18
